#### **Father Frank's Easter Letter**

Easter is a celebration of our Lord's resurrection from the dead, and it is the ultimate exercise in dealing with paradoxes. The resurrection from the dead is the ultimate paradox! THE TOMB IS EMPTY!

A former presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church said, "Heresy is the inability to believe paradox." This was certainly true in the days of the early Church. Most of the early heretics refused to accept the seeming paradox of God, a spirit being, taking on the flesh of a human. In Greek thinking, which influenced many of the heresies, flesh and spirit were incompatible: the two could not co-exist in the same being.

But paradox was a natural way of viewing life in the Jewish world in which Jesus lived. Hebrews had a very holistic view of life. God is the God of light and darkness, of day and light. The rain falls on the just and the unjust.

The paradoxes Jesus used in his teaching were not strange-sounding to his Jewish hearers. When Jesus said, "the last shall be first," or "to live you must die," the Jews understood these figures of speech.

But Jesus' very life was a paradox. He only loved, but was hated, and he was despised not by evil people, but by the very religious. Jesus was a master of the disciples, yet on the night of his betrayal, he became a servant to those who followed him, and demonstrated servitude by washing his disciples' feet.

And of course, the ultimate paradox is the death and resurrection of our Lord. There is no Easter without Good Friday. We, who have been baptized with Christ, also share in his death and resurrection. Or to use the closing words of the Prayer of Francis, "It is in dying to self, that we are born to eternal life." And because Christ rose victorious from the grave, our hope is there fixed, that we, too, will share in his resurrection and live with him forever!

But paradox confounds those who approach life using logic and reason. Anything outside the realm of the rational, or that which cannot be proven, does not exist. Besides, they argue, how can you base your belief system on concepts that are apparently contradictory?

Remember, heresy is the inability to deal with paradox.

Jesus said, in order to enter my kingdom, you must become, not wise or wealthy or powerful. In order to enter my kingdom, you must become like children. For childlike faith doesn't seek absolute truths. Childlike faith willingly accepts and continually marvels at *paradox*.

May God bless you and your loved ones with a joyous Easter. And, I pray that on this Easter, God will bless each of us with the gift of childlike faith.

## A Season of New Beginnings

Easter is the season of new beginnings! It is set during one of the most beautiful seasons of the year—the springtime. Many of the symbols of Easter are taken from the unfolding new life of spring, such as, the lily, Easter eggs, and bunny rabbits. What a fitting time for the Church to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus!

Interestingly the etiology of the term Easter provides insight into this wonderful time of year. Easter is derived from the German word *Eastre*, the name of a pagan goddess, whose feast was celebrated at the spring equinox. In Old English, the term *Eastre* came to designate the east, the direction of the rising sun, and originally referred to the goddess of the dawn. The association of new life at springtime and the rising sun are appropriate symbols for Easter.

We know that the Church repeatedly "Christianized" pagan holidays and "converted" them into the most significant Christian holidays—Christmas and Easter. Such practice reminds us that God always takes the ordinary and mundane events, substances, and people from daily life and uses them as vessels through which God has been revealed to humankind. This is the basis of the Christmas message, when the Spirit of God took on our flesh and came to live among us. It is also foundational to the message of Easter, when the Spirit of God breathed life into the body of the entombed Christ and raised him to new life!

From a biblical perspective, the church adapted some of the Jewish feasts and incorporated the story of Christ and the Church with those holidays. This is especially true of the Feasts of the Passover and Unleavened Bread. In the Christian tradition, Jesus is considered the Paschal lamb, through whose sacrifice on the cross and resurrection from the dead the salvation for those who would believe in his name would be won. Jesus also celebrated the Passover with his disciples, at which time the Eucharist was instituted. The Church commemorates these important events of the Passion over a three day period known as the *Triduum Sacrum* (Latin for "the sacred three days" — Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday). The climatic celebration of the victorious resurrection of Jesus is then observed on the Church's most notable and important feast, Easter Day!

Alleluia! Alleluia! Come worship, remember and celebrate during this season of new beginnings!

"... but chiefly are we bound to praise you for the glorious resurrection of your Son
Jesus Christ our Lord; for he is the true Laschal Lamb, who was sacrificed for us, and has taken away the sin of the world. By his death he has destroyed death, and by his rising to life again he has won for us everlasting life."

We read our ECW Prayer together and welcomed a couple of new members. We enjoyed coffee and refreshments while the various reports were given: Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, etc.

We had three matters to finalize: April's Retreat at Trinity Center April 11-12, donations for Trinity Center scholarship for one teenager at Trinity Center Senior Camp, and the presentation of the new officers for 2018-2019 by the Nominating Committee Chairperson, Bonnie Dolph.

After voting on the above, we settled into different cars and headed for the Horry County Recycling Center and Landfill. Our personality+ guide for the day loaded us in a big van and drove us straight to the top of their HUGE landfill. We learned all about the seagulls and eagles that live off the garbage, and the several different machines that spent the entire day smashing and grinding the garbage down into the earth. 400-600 trucks per day bring trash and garbage into this landfill. Only a small area of the landfill is worked each day with a six-inch covering of dirt added to this small area at the end of the day. It was a fascinating system that seemed to work very smoothly.

We were then driven over to another area that housed their state-of-theart recycling center. They average receiving 40 trucks of recyclable materials dumping here each day. Each piece of material is handled many times before bundled into its final shape. The workers stand all day long, sorting by color, weight, material, etc. Conveyor belts move the materials up and down and all around this huge building in amazing efficiency. We were all entranced by the whole facility.

As mentioned above, our April meeting will be a fun retreat, an overnight at Trinity Center. Dawn Kellerman and Telina West are the chairpersons for this trip, and we all look forward to it with much anticipation.

Our May meeting will be a potluck luncheon at the home of Toni DeLuca. Mark your calendars now for a delightful treat with lots of good food and fun on May 9. ALL of the women of St. James are automatically members of this vital group. Please Come!!!

Tom also distributed a description of the open board positions and elaborated on the duties of each one. If one of these positions is calling your name, please let Tom Horan know. You do not have to be a current delegate on the SBIC, just have a passion to help the needy in Brunswick County.

- 1. Public Relations/Communications Serve as the public voice of the SBIC.
- 2. CROP Walk/Praise in the Park Serve as the lead coordinator of this event.
