

Stewardship

Since the 1960s, our culture has been engaged in an experiment: what happens when we prioritize the individual over all things and leave community behind? What we find is that, without community, individual relationships suffer, as well. Community provides the support for relationships to flourish. I discovered this through the Episcopal Church.

When I was working on my doctorate, I became aware that most of my life was spent in isolation—reading, studying, and writing papers that few people would ever read. In addition, the university could not provide a real sense of community because its role was to be universal—open to all ideas and people. Community does not arise from merely not excluding. It is not negatively constructed. In order for people to bond, we need to share a deeper purpose. We need to be able to look at other people and see that we are working towards the same goal, and not merely avoiding the same problem. Human beings once shared the project of survival, but as technology relieved us of the awareness of our mutual dependence, we failed to replace that with anything that made us mindful of our common purpose and thus went down the path of individualism.

While I was working on my degree, I found the church, initially in the form of the university chaplaincy. This led to *St. Andrew's* in *Irvine, California*, a congregation about the

size of St. James. It was, I discovered, a place dedicated to loving others, not just to not excluding them. To loving others, not just to not excluding them. I discerned a call to ordination and had to remain within the same diocese while I went through the process. This placed me in an economic bind because there were no jobs in my field in the area. As I struggled to make ends meet, my life became stressful. Many academic quarters, I taught English as a Second Language at two or three different schools. (Schools avoided hiring teachers full time because they would have to pay benefits, so most of us teachers made the same circuit.) This meant that I would be in the classroom in various locations from 9:00 AM until noon, from 1:00 PM to 4:00 PM, and from 6:00 PM until 9:00 PM. With no evening classes on Friday, I would go to the gym, go home, watch The Gilmore Girls, and fall asleep in my chair. Between classes, I ate, prepared for class, and drove to the next location. I became so worn down that I developed a cold once a month for twenty-four months in a row. One might think that the last thing I needed was another obligation, but joining the choir provided sustaining camaraderie. In addition, many Saturdays, the choir director (who was a high school special education teacher with his own busy schedule) would meet with me for coffee. (In addition, my friend's mom would send over delicious Vietnamese food almost every Saturday so that I did not have to make dinner that day. Sunday afternoon, I would make a big pot of something and eat it until Friday.) These relationships sustained me until at last the diocese advanced me to postulancy and I moved to New York City for seminary.

There are few places outside religion that supply this kind of positive community—places that not only refuse to exclude, but that actively nourish. As fewer and fewer people attend church, there are fewer nourishing communities to support society and individuals, and we sink measurably deeper into a crisis of alienation, loneliness, and depression.

Our society's experiment with radical individualism will end at some point. We will realize that negatively defined community is really no community at all. We will see that we need to gather around the ultimate questions that we all face, but until that point, it is all the more important to keep the flame going and provide places where people can be a member of a community that nourishes the spirit. All of us work together to build this community by contributing our time, talent, and treasure. We draw upon our varying gifts to work together so that each one feels that he or she belongs.

The vestry's role in this endeavor is the finances and property of the church. It is tasked with financial planning for the future. Without an indication of how much the members will give in the coming year, we cannot budget for the life of the church in 2024. Each year since I arrived at the beginning of 2019, most pledges have come in very late, if at all. The members of the vestry spend anguished weeks trying to guess how we might pay the bills next year, and we are forced to present a deficit budget at the annual meeting.

Please exercise compassion and pledge by October 1. If your situation should change in the coming year, you can adjust your pledge in the middle of the season. Having some indication allows us to be secure in our planning for how we will support the community of God into our new year

Therefore will I trust you always though I may seem to be lost and in the shadow of death. I will not fear, for you are ever with me, and you will never leave me to face my perils alone.

SBIC - Serving Those in Need July Report

The South Brunswick Interchurch Council (SBIC)) monthly Executive Board Meeting was held on on Monday, July 10, 2023, at 10:00 a.m. at *The Lords Food Pantry* in Shallotte.

The Lords Food Pantry has served 1,972 children, 2,869 adults and 2,332 seniors for a total of 7,173 January thru June 2023.

The Emergency Food Assistance Program (**TEFAP**) distribution at The Lords Food Pantry served 77 families in June, or 235 individuals (52 children, 102 adults, and 81 seniors).

The **SBIC** also distributes *Commodity Supplemental Food Program* (**CSFP**) boxes to preregistered Senior clients. We received 80 boxes in June. We distributed 61 boxes on June 10, and 19 on June 17.

The Lords Food Pantry periodically receives Brunswick Wellness Coalition food boxes (similar to Senior boxes) and receives produce at the Food Pantry through this program.

The **SBIC** distributed 20 *Healthy Opportunities Pilot Program* (**HOP**) boxes in June.

The Lords Food Pantry received 2,935 pounds of food in June from the **PORCH** collection.

NOTE: The parking lot will be closed on August 5 and September 16, 2023 and May 18, 2024.

NOTE: Volunteers for the **VOAD** Working Group is on hold until we meet with the new *Brunswick County Emergency Management* lead.

R: Reign here among us, O Lord our God.


R: Send Thy might into our midst, O Lord our God.

WHEN 'BLUE" ISN'T "TRUE" .. or .. WAS IT ALL JUST A "TYPO?!"

Our next full moon happens again this month! Although its color will appear no different than any other full moon, we still call it a "Blue Moon." As the second full moon of a given month, this will technically fit the modern definition of the name but the actual phrase has been around for over 500 years, and it didn't always mean the same thing. Where did this mystery begin?

Guarded by the shimmering mists of time, the first written mention of a "blue moon" appears around the 16th century. According to folklorist Phillip Hiscock, a professor at Memorial University in Newfoundland, "In the English language, the first use that we have is by Cardinal Wolsey," (Henry VIII's notorious adviser) who "...writes about his intellectual enemies who 'would have you believe the moon is blue." While others attribute it to William Shakespeare, writing from 1585 to 1613, or from even earlier, 1528, in a pamphlet by two Greenwich friers, William Roy and Jerome Barlow, the meaning was still the same; an attempt by someone in authority to dupe common people into believing something ridiculous if not totally impossible. And the meaning remains the same; an absurdity or impossibility. Over time, the phrase softened to mean something rare or uncommon, but still, the association of the second monthly moon with the word "blue" remains a mystery. Some scholars connected it to the Old English word "belewe", pronounced the same as our color but meaning "to betray." So, the second full moon was "belewe" because it tricked us by showing up too soon?

By the 1700's, the phrase was altered to more represent "time" with a closer meaning of "never." From there, "blue moon" resurfaces in 19th century London, used by the masses as street slang for "a long time" and even appears in an 1869 account of a ship-wreck survivor noting "that indefinite period known as a blue moon." Even though we don't know how or why the phrase became tied to actual lunar events, we do know where this happened. The state of Maine, USA. And as our prime suspect: our very own *The Maine Farmers' Almanac* (no relation to the current *Farmers' Almanac*).

In the need for codifying natural trends so farmers could better plan their crops, The Maine Farmers' Almanac went by the numbers. Each season is three months long giving an average of three full moons per season (one for every month). However, with lunar cycles being not so regimented, or perhaps blissfully unaware of our calendars, Luna just doesn't ride that train; Earth dates align in such a way that some seasons will see a fourth. Oddly, the Maine Almanac began calling the third full moon of the season a blue moon! No one in any research knows why, exactly. Unanchored theories flew about like confetti in a twister; in the Czech language, the third moon is traditionally called "blue"; in French a second moon of a month would be "la deus lune," meaning two; the Almanac itself started using colors to depict various moons; others still believed that third moons were considered bad luck and therefore "blue." Of all the suspects, only one stood out - journalist error. A typo.

In 1946, amateur astronomer James Hugh Pruett wrote an article about "blue moons" for *Sky & Telescope* magazine. Whether purposefully or by mistake, he altered the usage found in *The Maine Farmers' Almanac* and redefined "a blue moon as **the second full moon** in a calendar month - a coincidence of dates that occurs about every three years." By the time Pruett's error had been discovered - half a century later - his simple definition had stuck. All was fine until Philip Hiscock -remember him - enters the equation, and with that, gives us a second mystery; *yes* - there are now officially two different kinds of "blue moon!"

In the March 1999 issue of *Sky & Telescope* magazine, Hiscock had uncovered more of the term's origins as well as the mistake made by Pruett and concluded that by the math and history he had researched, *The Maine Almanac's* definition was the one true "blue moon." Not a second full moon in one month but **the third full moon of a season with four.** While Pruett's typo is the more commonly used definition, the original, and possibly more historically accurate "third moon" of any season's four are both currently in use.





He said, "I think the phrase has a real hook in it for people..." A society, he feels, now further separated from our natural surroundings than it has ever been. ".. (it) links people in a way that a lot of other things cannot. It feels old-fashioned while at the same time right here and now. It reduces that alienation from nature for many people." For business-minded North Americans, it is also a term that has been very profitable commercially.

August, 2023's second full moon will rise on the night of the 30th, at 9:35pm. As the third of four "Super Moons" of the year, it is also the closest of the lot, promising to be brighter than any of this year. And while blue moons will be with us again in three years' time, this "Super Moon" promises to be the kind of thrilling cosmos spectacle we can enjoy only once in a well, you know...
